

## The Wild and Not So Wild Life of Rajasthan, India

Within India's "Golden Triangle", a popular tourist route featuring the famed sites of Delhi, the pink city of Jaipur and the Taj Mahal at Agra, lie a number of National Parks and preserves. The Bird Nuts, Wendy Blackwell and Ian Wallis, will show photos of their visits to three of these areas in February, 2109: the National Chambal Sanctuary, a section of the Chambal River which is home to endangered Indian Skimmers and Gharial Crocodiles; Keoladeo National Park at Bharatpur, once a rajah's private hunting preserve, now managed wetlands and wintering grounds for multitudes of birds; and the varied terrain and wildlife of Ranthambore National Park, where Ian was able to fulfil a long-held wish to search for tigers in the wild.



#### **Exciting Sightings**

With the spring (vernal) equinox on March  $20^{th}/21^{st}$ , the lengthening of daylight hours, and the thawing of our wetlands, sloughs, and reservoirs, we are seeing our first signs of spring migration. On March  $4^{th}$ , Dan and Mark Schiebelbein reported their exciting sighting of more than 2000 **Snow Buntings** on the north side of the Wildcat Trail, about 2 kilometers west of Michelle Reservoir. By mid-April bunting flocks are heading north to their breeding grounds.

**Tundra Swans** have been observed flying over and/or stopping at various locations including  $\sim$ 400 swans reported at Cavan Lake by Phil and Annalora Horch on April 2<sup>nd</sup>. Swan sightings can also include **Trumpeter Swans**, which may be part of a small breeding population established near Grande Prairie. This species is

larger, and lacks the yellow spot in front of the eye of the tundra swan.

The first sighting this spring of a **Ferruginous Hawk** was reported on March 14<sup>th</sup>, when Ben Velner, Milt Spitzer, and Bob Frew observed a single bird along RGE Rd. 63 south of Manyberries. Other raptor sightings on that date included a **Prairie Falcon** along HWY 889, and two **Golden Eagles** at Saint Margaret's Church on Eagle Butte Rd. in the Cypress Hills.

During the maintenance of bluebird boxes along The Carol Porter Bluebird Trail on March 22<sup>nd</sup>, Milt Spitzer reported the sighting of three male **Mountain Bluebirds** near Saint Margaret's Church on Eagle Butte Rd. This early migrant is a harbinger of spring in the Cypress Hills.

Accipiter species reported at Police Point Park included a **Northern Goshawk** on March 22<sup>nd</sup> and a **Cooper's Hawk** on March 31<sup>st</sup>. This latter species has bred successfully in the park in previous years. The male usually arrives in the first week of April, and is joined by the female a week or so later.

The songs and sightings of **Western Meadowlarks** were being reported by a number of GN birders in the latter part of March. This species is much welcomed as a harbinger of spring in the grasslands.

Activity has returned to the heronry directly across the river from Police Point Drive NE, with up to fifty **Great Blue Herons** tallied as of April 9<sup>th</sup>.

The distinctive drumming, along with sightings of **Pileated Woodpecker(s)** at Police Point Park has been reported on numerous occasions in March and April. Is this species breeding in our river valley?

Dan Scheibelbein reported a **Townsend's Solitaire** perched on a large poplar tree along a walking path across from his NE Crescent Heights residence on April 7<sup>th</sup>, and also a second sighting on a spruce tree in his backyard on April 8<sup>th</sup> (possibly the same bird). This species breeds in the Rocky Mountain and foothill regions, and has been observed in small numbers in spring and fall in the grasslands, however they can be easily missed. The species is gray in colour, has a distinguishing white eye ring, buffy wing patches, and white tail patches.

#### **Annual GN Field Trip to Manyberries Area**



On March 30 eight participants (Ben Velner (leader), Eileen Cowtan, Val and Fay Felesky, Ken Meyer, Pearl Dubourt, Milt and Elaine Spitzer participated in the annual trip to the Manyberries area. The weather was ideal, the wildlife viewing was marvelous, and the exotic tallies were remarkable.

The group, in 3 vehicles, travelled south along the Black and White Trail to Manyberries, then explored the range and township roads southwest of Manyberries stopping at a ranch before heading back to the Hat along the Wildcat and Eagle Butte Roads.

A total of 24 bird species were noted with exceptional views of Ferruginous Hawks (7 in total). Other notable sightings included: Tundra Swan (30), six species of ducks, Northern Harriers (2), Great Horned Owls (4), several Mountain Bluebirds and the true harbinger of spring five Western Meadowlarks. We did observe 9 Sharptailed Grouse, two displaying in a field before our usual lek. There were only 6 on the lek which were only displaying half heartedly. The ninth was observed on a telephone pole along the Black and White Trail.

Five species of mammals were observed including many Mule and White-tailed Deer, a small herd of

many Mule and White-tailed Deer, a small herd of Pronghorns, three coyotes and of course the ubiquitous Richardson Ground Squirrels.



The strangest sightings were at a ranch site where we observed two pot-bellied pigs (so heavy their bellies were dragging on the ground, two guard geese, 3 border collies, a dozen peacocks, five guinea fowl, domesticated ducks and a variety of exotic chickens.

Thanks Ben for again leading this fascinating spring trip.





#### Nature Alberta meeting March 30 (Part 1) and April 3 (Part 2) Highlights

1. Following are the highlights from the Nature Alberta Policy Statement on the Conservation of Large Carnivores in Alberta

(ie. **grizzly bears** – sport hunting of grizzlies was discontinued in 2006 and grizzlies were listed as threatened in 2010 by the AB government, **wolf** – a plan has not been updated since 1991, approximate population of 7000, two wolf control programs are in place for a) bounty in municipal districts to reduce livestock depredation and b) Alberta government for a caribou recovery measures, **cougar** – the population is slowly expanding, and **black bears** – the population is stable)

- goal is to sustain healthy populations
- restore integrity of carnivore habitat (particularly Rocky Mountains and the foothills)
- does not support bounties and other widespread control programs, but if not possible or appropriate (eg. public safety) then control efforts to be conducted in a way that is as humane as possible
- supports complete ban on the use of pesticide strychnine
- Nature Alberta's position is that there is no need to rehabilitate orphaned wildlife for conservation purposes
- Nature Alberta does not categorically oppose rehabilitation programs, as long as efforts conform with strict protocols (ie. a detailed follow up for released individuals for one year with appropriate radio tracking device monitoring)
- 2. There is no longer funding to support **NatureWILD** publication for kids 12 years old and younger in conjunction with the Nature Kids program. A discussion was held to integrate this publication as part of the Nature Alberta magazine.
- 3. Concerning the **Nature Alberta magazine**, it was suggested to send one e-mail to one contact for each club. Then that person from each club could distribute the Nature Alberta magazine to their individual members that want to receive it electronically.
- 4. Everyone can subscribe to the monthly **Nature Alberta e-newsletter**. To do this follow these steps: a) go to the Nature Alberta website (naturealberta.ca), b) click on the 'PUBLICATIONS' link in the top bar, c) scroll down to 'Nature Alberta e-News' and subscribe
- 5. 50th Anniversary of Nature Alberta is in 2020
  - some initial planning has started
  - suggested to have a major event in Edmonton in October, 2020
  - suggested to have a field trip in each part of the province once per month in 2020 that is sponsored by the different clubs. Note: Could GNS hold a special field trip and what month would work best for us???
  - a letter outlining the plans and information concerning the  $50^{\rm th}$  Anniversary will be mailed out to the Chairperson of each club
- 6. A **Strategic Planning Committee** was set up to work with the Executive Director (Brian) to build a plan for the next three to five years. They will meet later this month.
- 7. The **financial concerns** were mentioned again. The executive feels the outlook for grants does not look good over the next three to five years. More fund raising is needed.

#### **Communications Committee Annual Report for 2018**

The Communications Committee consists of: Eileen Cowtan, who sends out group emails to keep the GNS members up to date; Milt Spitzer, who produces the Chronicle newsletter each month; Paul Thibault, who updates and manages the GNS website; Tina Regehr, who updates and manages Facebook for GNS; and myself.

Since World Water Day is in March a table was set up at the Medicine Hat Public Library for the week. The Riparian Health Assessment display was set up as well as various rack cards and brochures from the club were available for the public to view. A table was set up at the Farmer's Market three times, once in each of the months of May, June, and September. Since we are a non-profit society there was no charge, so this was a great way to advertise our club.


